PASTOR'S ADDRESS

Belting out Alleluia!

Dear Bethanians,

When our daughter, Maren, studied in Chile during a semester in college, Laurie and I traveled to Chile along with some friends to visit her there. We arrived during Holy Week, and so I walked to the local Lutheran Church to attend worship on Easter Sunday. It was a historic church there in Valparaiso, obvious by its architecture that it has a strong German influence. Indeed, German script adorned the inside walls of the sanctuary, most likely including the words "Ein Feste Burg" (A Mighty Fortress).

When the worship began, I had little comprehension of what was being said, other than guessing at familiar liturgical calls and responses. It sounded foreign to me because, being in Chili, the worship was of course conducted in Spanish. And then we got to the great Easter hymns, again familiar in their tunes, but difficult for me to shape the words...until we arrived at the "ALLALUIAS". It was then that I belted out with all the gusto I could muster, "Alleluia!" That is the universal language of Easter. In the midst of things that seem so foreign, "ALLELUIA!"

A Bethany Quilter's Story

Gladys Schulz, the quilter, has a history of always loving sewing beginning as a young girl. She started with making her own clothes as a youngster, even creating outfits for her little sister. She learned sewing from her mom, as well as an outstanding 9th grade sewing teacher.

The tale of quilting began more than sixty years ago when her young family moved into a small home. She needed blankets for the kids' bunk beds but had no money for that. Her mom gave her some old, worn blankets. With a basket of scraps, she pieced together a covering for the blanket and sewed it on. This was her first experience.

Next was twenty-four years later when she wanted to make a quilt for a wedding gift. Slowly, but surely, she made progress. But she realized that starting smaller was better so baby quilts were next on her list. Mind you, she was tying the quilts as machine quilting wasn't in use for home projects. Later, she began to quilt by hand.

Her friend, Kathy, wanted to learn about quilting. Soon they were attending Kitsap Quilters which had Gladys thinking, "I can do that!" It was inspiring. With Kathy, she began attending some of the lectures on quilting. Her first blue ribbon was a joint project with Kathy. Kathy pieced the material and Gladys, with Kathy's encouragement, machine quilted it. They were on their way!

Kathy encouraged Gladys to continue machine quilting which was no easy endeavor with a regular sewing machine. Eventually, she used a portable long arm in which she had to walk and shuttle the pedal. Not easy! Her husband, Ralph, built her a table long enough for the long arm.

Now she has a real long arm machine which has a laser printer, so she can be very creative with the various quilting design stitches. Gladys leans more to the modern style of quilting now as opposed to the traditional. Gladys still participates with the Rachel Circle quilters, making tops for the group. Gladys worked on all three quilts being auctioned by Rachel Circle.



Her advice is to start small – think baby quilts or place mats. Have fun putting the colors together. One of the beautiful aspects of quilting – there is no wrong design or way to do it!

AFFORDABLE HOUSING UPDATE

The Odyssey Continues!

In March, the COBI Planning Commission met twice – on March 10 and March 24. Both were marathon meetings that included hours of discussion addressing a draft ordinance for Bethany that would implement the request for an "increased density bonus" granted to religious organizations constructing affordable housing on their property under a 2019 Washington statute (RCW 36.70A.545). Much of the discussion involved whether the ordinance should address only Bethany or if its provisions should seek to apply throughout the Island. (Note that the City Council requested a "pilot"!) There also were many proposed amendments discussed, but the current formula that would allow up to approximately 20 units on Bethany's property remains in place. Also, some problematic conditions/criteria were removed, which was an encouraging development. In addition, the support of the Executive Directors of HRB, Helpline

House, and the Bainbridge Community Foundation, as well as emails of support from many members of Bethany and community members at large (including the governor!) have been enormously important! Thanks to all who have voiced their support!

The next Planning Commission meeting will be on Thursday, April 14 (Maundy Thursday). It is possible that meeting will see adoption of a draft ordinance and a referral back to the City Council for action. That would mean that the Council would take up the ordinance, probably in the May time frame. You can learn more about the issues being addressed by the Planning Commission by reviewing the meeting packet for the meeting on March 24; the next packet should be distributed on April 8 or 9. From the Bishop

One of the things I love about living in the Pacific Northwest is the abundance of life. In January, the grass is green. In February, plants are blooming. In March, little flowers are pushing through the soil. In April, color bursts out everywhere. To me, these signs of life are miracles.



And don't we need some of these signs right now? I mean, there are so many places where it feels like ongoing winter – the discord and acrimony amongst families, churches, peoples, and nations. As I write this article Russia is invading Ukraine. Perhaps when you read this article, things will be different but at this moment there is bombing and shooting and fear and death. And entrenched crises continue: houselessness, racism, ableism, unjust governments, and so much more. Individually, many are experiencing physical and mental illness, fatigue, and exclusion. I remember a quote from C. S. Lewis' book *The Lion, The Witch, and the Wardrobe* where one of the characters says, "It is winter in Narnia, and has been for ever so long...always winter, but never Christmas."

It has been a long winter...perhaps even two years of winter. Pain and sorrow and death feel very close. There is grief; there is anger; there is exhaustion; and there is sadness.

And yet...And yet...

Gardens are full of seeds. Farmers are tilling the soil. Tulips are blooming. Rhododendrons are on their way. We see signs around us that winter is ending and the Bringer of Spring is coming.

As I travel through this synod, I see signs of new life and new hope. I see resolve and new partnerships. While there are challenges that we are all facing, while there is much work to do individually and together, I sense new possibilities.

When I meet with councils and other leaders in congregations, I am delighted that we are having good, strong, sometimes difficult conversations about things that matter. In our best moments, we are not as concerned about smaller difficulties but instead, as people of faith, we are leaning into what it means to love God and love neighbor in this time and in this place. I thank God for the opportunity for conversation, listening, and moving on the Breath of God's Spirit.

The truth is, alone – we cannot create life, alone – we cannot change systems, alone – we cannot move winter into spring. But *through Christ*, through the One who died for this world and who is raised into new life, we can.

And so, as it is written in Paul's second letter to the Corinthians:

We do not lose heart. Even though our outer nature is wasting away, our inner nature is being renewed day by day. For this slight momentary affliction is preparing us for an eternal weight of glory beyond all measure, because we look not at what can be seen but at what cannot be seen; for what can be seen is temporary, but what cannot be seen is eternal. 2 Corinthians 16-18

We are promised that through this time, through world events, through whatever is next, Jesus is with us. And even more than that, we are promised that there is something amazing beyond all measure – more than we can know or even imagine. It is difficult to sometimes comprehend this promise – especially when we look at the destruction and pain and devastation in this world – and yet...and yet...we cling to the promise. As people of faith, we pray and whisper and shout it out – that through Christ's death and resurrection all things that create death will be gone. Period. Full. Stop.

And because of knowing and trusting this promise, we are then called, as beloved children of God, to see, appreciate, and tend to the small plants entrusted to us – knowing that we also are plants, also seeds, also soil, called to live into and share this new life with and for others.

May this Easter spring forth with new life for you. May you feel the hope given through Jesus. And may together we shout, "Happy Easter! Christ is risen! Christ is risen indeed!"

However, this is a matter that will be decided by the United States government. LCSNW organization has no control over who leaves Ukraine, where they will go, and when. There is no official information yet about the adoption of any special U.S. program for accepting refugees resulting
