PASTOR'S ADDRESS

Joyful Vigilance

Dear Bethanians,



I invite you into joyful vigilance this summer. I would characterize this as a posture of embracing the gift of joy, while being mindful/watchful/respectful/loving toward our neighbors.

This occurred to me as we were, with great joy and love, caring for our new grandson, Fritz. The joy was absolutely bursting from us, as we gazed for hours upon his sweet countenance. As he slept in his "magic pillow," as he enjoyed the coolness of his changing table, as he sat in his car seat going on an adventure, he held our attention at every moment.

When I held him, I felt myself wrapping my hands around him, making sure he was secure. In the first days, my vigilance, my determination to hold on, probably conveyed to him a certain nervousness on my part. Over time I felt able to relax a bit more and to hold him firmly, yet gently, giving him room to move and stretch and to express his newfound (2 months now) freedom.

Oh, yes, one of many such baby parables to be shared by this pastor, but this applies as well to other dimensions of our life together. Joyful vigilance is that which we exercise in these days when it seems we are moving out of Covid restrictions, and yet...concerns remain for those, especially under 12, who are unvaccinated; when variants, like the Delta variant, are to be considered; and when there are those who remain vulnerable because of their conditions. This is a time to whoop with all out joy! It is also a time to be vigilant in our love for our neighbor.

Next week I will be visiting our new baby great-nephew, who spent some time in NICU. Guidelines are unclear as to what is required as precaution, but Laurie and I are being Covid tested (me for the first time) in advance of that meet-up because I want to be loving and respectful to the parents and baby.

When I joyfully enter stores, even though I am vaccinated I generally continue to wear a mask, doing so out of a sense of respect for the workers who are required to be in contact with so many people. Although I dislike wearing masks, I tap into my reserve of joy, so that my vigilance may be that of love and respect.

"Joyful vigilance" was at play during the "heat dome" days (and nights) we experienced. I was filled with joy at having a cool building in which to work and hang out. In addition, our love of neighbor and its accompanying vigilance invited us to open the Bethany building as a cooling center, which evolved because of the need into an overnight cooling center for the half-dozen people who needed it. From that came fun friendships (people exchanging contact info) and joyous storytelling. We had a guest who grew up spending summers in a lighthouse on Cape Cod!

And joyful vigilance will be our approach to our worship services this summer. We will gather, in person, doing so with great joy, but also striving to be respectful of one another, loving toward our neighbor, as we do so. Nothing will diminish that joy that is ours in Christ, and in our vigilance that joy may well deepen.

WORSHIP AT BETHANY

Summer Inside and Outside

I have been told that summer on Bainbridge Island begins on July 4th. And while summer made an early entrance this year, we began our summer worship schedule the July 4th weekend. We are moving our in-person worship service out of the parking lot (unless we have an unseasonal rain/snow shower) and into the patio area between the church and education building. There we will enjoy an outdoor experience with the benefit of shade; we have half a dozen or so parking spots if any prefer to remain in their cars, listening to the FM transmitter.

In July and August for the **10am Sunday morning worship**, you are invited to bring a folding chair, or use one of the church's plastic chairs, which will be on location. Those who would like to sit on the lawn may do so, in an area that is just behind the worship leadership, on the hill above the playground. (Children are very welcome to play in the playground during the worship if that is OK with their parents)

Periodically in July and August, Bethany will hold a **5:00pm Saturday evening worship** service indoors for those who are vaccinated. The singing will be limited, but we will share in prayer, in the Word, and in Holy Communion, in a worship liturgy that is similar to that of Sunday morning. The next Saturday evening worship will be on July 17th at 5pm.

Coffee Hour after the 10am Sunday morning worship also makes a return this summer. Bethany will provide the coffee, juice and lemonade as well as disposable cups and napkins. Volunteer hosts will provide light snacks, set up and clean up. There will be a sign-up sheet to host on the coffee hour table Sunday mornings, or sign up by calling Debbie in the church office.

Working with Island Volunteer Caregivers and Bainbridge Prepares, Bethany became an overnight cooling center, providing an essential service to several people who were experiencing home temperatures in the 90s. Pastor Paul was grateful that Bethany could provide this service, and touched by the note of gratitude he found the next morning.

A Bethany Reflection

Greetings Bethanians and all those who care for this community. My name is Helen Stoll and I am a member of the Bethany Bible Study group that meets on the second Monday of each month. This year members have committed to write a monthly note of appreciation for the Bethany community. Where to begin?

My husband and I have been a part of the Bethany community since the 'early aughts' (2000s) when we moved from Shoreline, north of Seattle, to Kingston, north of Bainbridge. We both recognized immediately that Bethany is a joyful gathering of people, a deep sense of love – happy to be together – uplifting and accompanying one another with prayer and presence. This is a community that is rich in blessings, talent and treasure, and generous in stewardship of those blessings within Bethany, in local communities and around the nation and globe. Worship in word, sacraments, and music are central to Bethany's identity which quickly drew me in.

I grew up in a small Lutheran post WWII mission congregation on the outskirts of Portland, Oregon. I can still remember as a young child how happy all the parents were to be together, worshiping, singing, 'potlucking' – lots of jello and tuna casseroles. In my adulthood I understood that these were young people whose first *decade* of adult life had been suspended by an all-consuming war. They were thankful to be able to return to their families and communities and begin their own families.

With the exception of those (sadly typically Lutheran) early adult, 'independent' years, I have been blessed to be part of praying and accompanying congregations with all of their faithfulness and challenges. Through all the joys and vagaries of life growing up, raising our own two sons, and loving our growing family, the prayerfully faithful community has been essential.

My vivacious Mother was stricken with Lupus at 29 years old. Being steeped in her own Lutheran childhood she knew how to both receive and give back in Christian community while our family was lovingly supported through the years, an experience that is deep in my bones. I am fortunate to keep in touch with 'the girls' with whom I was confirmed. Oh, the stories, laughter, and tears we share!

Evan and I still meet monthly, since 1980, with our Marriage Encounter Circle, all members of our previous church in Shoreline. As you can imagine having raised children, completed careers, and enjoying retirement, some members have now joined that great cloud of witnesses of which the writer of the letter to the Hebrews speaks. We give thanks for and rejoice in the hope of the resurrection as we remember them, and encourage one another... Lots of laughter, prayers, and some tears.

I remember clearly on the first morning worshipping in Bethany's sanctuary being drawn to the beautiful wooden cross and to the clear windows behind it. Comforting and open to the wider world, all part of our lives as God's people. Through those windows I can trace the seasons of both the church year and of creation – while listening carefully to the sermon, of course...

Over nearly a year now, as our lives and life together have been up-ended, many of us have been worshipping in the parking lot among the trees both deciduous and evergreen. As I sit in the car, I have come to regard the line of the tips of the evergreen trees across the western horizon as a comforting 'window' also. No matter the challenges that have come my way, we still gather to worship.

Somehow I did not anticipate the glory of the blossoming ornamental fruit trees until they burst upon us! A gracious surprise. As I "feasted my eyes" on their color, I realized their advanced age and remembered

those like Sid Malbon who, more than a half a century ago, planned and planted the landscape surrounding us. They too are part of that 'great cloud of witnesses' that accompany us. I am comforted by that continuity and by the variety in ages and backgrounds of all who continue to gather virtually and in our cars.

And I am thankful to God for God's church in all its forms, most especially this faithful community who makes music like angels, feasts together at the Lord's table – i.e. currently our vehicle dashboards and kitchen tables – and, once again will slurp coffee (and tea) and accompany one another in each other's *real* presence. Until then and beyond, we remain God's faithful people in God's church and in the world. Hallelujah!

Sanctuary Roof Update

Since condensation in the ceiling of the Sanctuary was identified as a serious problem in early 2020, Bethany Lutheran contracted with a consulting firm to evaluate the issue. Their investigation confirmed the problem and cause. Based on that investigation a solution was identified by the Bethany Roof Committee. The solution to the problem will require replacement of the ceiling and roof insulation. We are working to create a Master Plan to identify work elements that could address possible related opportunities in the Sanctuary. Work is underway to clarify the scope of work and estimated costs of a project that will be presented to the Bethany Church Council for acceptance and presentation to the Congregation for approval and funding.

Back to School Supplies for Lutheran World Relief

The BI/NK CROP Hunger Walk is one of the strongest and longest-running CROP Walks in the nation. Each year, we rank among the top walks in the nation for funds raised – thanks to the amazing support of our faithful recruiters, our local faith communities, and our anonymous matching donor. We've walked for 25 years and raised nearly \$1 million toward hunger relief, with 20% going to Helpline House and 5% going to NK Fishline Food Bank.

While rain, wind and even pandemics have never stopped the local event (although we went "virtual" in 2020!), there is a serious possibility that our dwindling volunteer team may be forced to announce that 2021 will be the final chapter in this great happening. As creative and innovative as our small team has become in these trying times, we can't see a way to continue if we don't pick up some new (young?) bodies to help with the event.

Our hope is to have a couple of fresh faces on the team this summer so they can join the 2021 effort and get their feet wet - figuratively. We are hoping for a dry walk in September! With four or five folks on the CROP team, the event flows quite smoothly with just enough sporadic organization to keep Church World Service amazed at our efforts and always using us as an example for the rest of the country.

Report of the 2021 Northwest Washington Synod Assembly

The 2021 Northwest Washington Synod Assembly, held on Saturday, May 15, was memorable for many reasons. Since last year's Assembly was cancelled, this was the first Assembly for Bishop Shelley Bryan Wee, and the first to be held electronically in our synod. With 332 voting members participating – including Pastor Paul, Linnea Chu, Peter Miles, and David and Barbara Swartling from Bethany – it might have been labeled an "AZoombly".



Despite logistical challenges, the key ingredients of a Synod Assembly, including worship, adoption of constitutional and bylaw amendments, reports of elections, and approval of a budget went smoothly. In addition, the recognition of milestone anniversaries of rostered ministers was particularly moving as were reports on new ministries in the Synod. Indeed, Bishop Bryan Wee highlighted five focus areas for Synod ministry since her election: faithful innovation; youth and young adults; leadership; connection and racial justice. Under these mantras, a number of new and innovative ministries have begun, including Living Stones prison ministry, the Stilly Valley Dinner Church, and Growing Young, an emerging strategy to attract youth and young adults! There is also LIVE (Living into Vocational Engagement), which can best be appreciated by viewing the video on the Synod Website: www.lutheransnw.org.

The representative of the ELCA churchwide organization was Rev. Christopher Otten, ELCA Director of Federal Chaplaincies. A former Lt. Colonel in the Air Force, he served 21 years as a chaplain, most recently in Afghanistan. Interestingly, Rev. Otten described serving as an ELCA Chaplain to having o(-) blood, because our Lutheran theology enables them to provide support and counsel to people of all faiths, just as someone with o(-) blood is a universal donor.

Bishop Bryan Wee also shared that the Synod distributed \$117,000 in Covid Relief funds to congregations and other recipients, and that mission support from the synod's congregations was close to the budgeted amount despite the pandemic. As the Assembly drew to a close, we learned that Bethany was one of the recipients of a Grace Grant; it was awarded \$20,000 in seed funds for our affordable housing vision!

Even electronically, participating in the Synod Assembly reminded us that we are interdependent partners in the ministry of the ELCA!
